Perfect Poinsettias



Materials

Flower/Leaf templates (1 per Cub Scout to trace)

Red and green construction paper (1 sheet per Cub Scout)

Scissors

Pencil (for tracing templates onto colored paper and for punching a hole)

Green chenille stem (1 per Cub Scout)

Glue


Small pieces of yellow construction paper rolled into small balls

Pushpins (to help punch two holes)


Directions:

1. Cut out a flower/leaf template from the copied cardstock. Each Cub Scout needs one template to trace.
2. Trace the template 2 times on red paper and 1 time on green paper.
3. Cut out the flower and the leaf that have been traced onto the colored paper.
4. Glue the 2 flowers together. Position the flowers in such a way that the first flower's petals stick out from the spaces in between the second flower's petals.
5. Glue the leaf behind the bottom flower. Position the leaf so that its points stick out from the poinsettia's petals.
6. Using a pushpin and a pencil, carefully poke two holes in the center of the glued poinsettia.
7. Bend your green chenille stem in half and pull it through the holes in the poinsettia.
8. Make 3 small pieces of yellow paper and roll them into 3 balls. Glue these balls onto the middle of the flower on top of the chenille stem.
9. Once the flower has dried completely, you can use the chenille stem to attach your flower to almost anything as a decoration.


